Volunteering opportunities open at Pensthorpe Natural Park

One of Norfolk's largest attractions is offering members of the public with an interest in wildlife and gardening an opportunity to develop their knowledge.

Pensthorpe Natural Park, near Fakenham, is opening up new volunteering opportunities in aviculture, horticulture, practical conservation and visitor interaction.

Volunteering opportunities offer a chance to enhance physical and mental wellbeing, learn new skills, improve social interaction, meet new people, develop CVs and open doors to further employment.

Duties include working with the wardens and gardeners to develop the presentation of the 700-acre reserve, running wildlife demonstrations for visitors and supporting the Pensthorpe Conservation Trust in protecting threatened species such as Turtle Doves, Red Squirrels and Corncrakes.

The voluntary roles can be performed on a fixed day each week or developed more flexibly to fit around the other commitments of each volunteer.

Deb Jordan, owner of Pensthorpe Natural Park, comments: "Volunteers are a vital and valuable part of our workforce. Our volunteers bring a raft of complementary and contrasting skills and experience which help our teams develop new ideas and grow.

"They have the power to inspire and excite our visitors about the natural world, often thanks to their own passion for nature and areas of special interest. We advocate any activity which opens dialogue between experts, enthusiasts and families in the hope that we can pass on the wonder of the outdoors.

"We welcome volunteers of all ages and backgrounds, and with different areas of experience and training. As well as helping you to develop new skills these opportunities will be well suited to those already studying for career paths in Horticulture, Arboriculture, Countryside Management and Conservation."

Allan Archer, from Wymondham, is a volunteer at Pensthorpe and credits voluntary work with enhancing his knowledge of wildlife and conservation, and improving his mental wellbeing: "Volunteering has absolutely transformed me and it's something I wished I'd done years ago! It's so rewarding – I can't emphasise enough how important it's been in changing my life.

"There is no greater feeling than seeing others get enthused about nature. Working somewhere like Pensthorpe, with plenty of biodiversity, means that wildlife sets the agenda for the day – what could be more thrilling than that?"

Volunteers are provided with training, an induction and a familiarisation trip along with regular catch-up meetings. Volunteering opportunities are also available for community and corporate groups.
